Greetings.

This letter is always about hope. We look out the windows at snowdrifts and reminisce about warmer months and the good times we share at camp during those few glorious months of Maine summer. There is hope too that in the coming summer we may get a chance to do some of those things we have always wanted but just never got around to. Maybe it's a trip to Bible Point or a paddle around the lake, or a project around the camp or a gathering of special 'summer friends'. Whatever your persuasion you have to admit that time spent at camp is special and that we are fortunate to have a small slice of such a beautiful place. I hope our children will enjoy it's beauty and soul rejuvenating karma as much as I do, and those that came before me. As much as this is about hope it is also about responsibility and we hope the Lakes Association can, in some small way, help all of us understand the forces of (man and) nature that affect our lakes and what condition they will be in when we 'pass them on' to the next generation.

2022 was a year of unprecedented levels of reporting about cataclysmic weather events. We've heard them all; drought, flooding and landslides in California, tornadoes ripping up the Midwest and South, massive snowfall and flooding in the Northeast, roads and buildings collapsing right here in our own backyard. Though we are relatively unscathed from major weather disasters, we too have seen some changes in what mother nature provides. It brings me to think about "tipping point". What is the moment or trigger that moves the needle from good to going bad, going downhill or breaking down? We need to better understand what happened to lakes in Maine (Annabessacook Lake, China Lake, Cobbosseecontee Lake, Echo Lake, Madawaska Lake, the Belgrade Lakes, Sebasticook Lake to name a few) that changed from clean water to having algae blooms. We have good but limited data on water quality from Pleasant and Mattawamkeag lakes that indicate pretty stable conditions over the years. In spite of that many have expressed concern over the slimy layer of sediment along the shoreline of Pleasant and the increasing presence of metaphyton algae in Mattawamkeag Lake. We should take stock in what other lakes associations have discovered and that is 'water quality can no longer be taken for granted'. There are too many factors, both human and natural, that impact how healthy lakes work. We stress the importance of how one person can make a difference and we offer, again, our Lakesmart program and our driveway water diverter program as ways of helping to preserve and enjoy our precious natural resources.

We are excited also to announce a new and budding relationship with the College of Ecology and Environmental Science and the Climate Change Institute at the University of Maine. Through a collaborative effort with the Town of Island Falls (Selectman Tony Binotto), we have been included in a study to determine the effects of climate on algae growth. This study will hopefully give us yet another insight into the health of our lakes. With more information and with good habits at our lakeside habitats we can hopefully keep the tipping point at a distance.

Looking forward to seeing you all this coming summer.

VOLUNTEER LAKES MONITORING PROGRAM

On June 17, 2022, IFLA Trustees Sherry Pettyjohn, Sue Burgos and Mary Ardizzone, attended a Lake Monitoring Certification Session at Nickerson Lake with other area volunteers. The training and certifications were provided by Lake Stewards of Maine as a part of their Volunteer Lake Monitoring Program. On a rainy day, we boarded a boat that took us to a locally owned barge to receive instruction and then perform simulated water quality testing in order to get certified. In Sherry's case, she was successfully recertified in dissolved oxygen and thermal profile testing, as well as secchi disc transparency readings. Mary and Sue received their initial certifications in secchi disc readings. "Dan Kinney, our volunteer on Mattawamkeag Lake,



travelled to Auburn earlier in the season to receive his recertification." Volunteer water quality monitors go to both Pleasant and Mattawamkeag Lakes every two weeks between June and September to collect and record data that directly relates to the health of our waters.

CLIMATE CHANGE & THE HEALTH OF MAINE LAKES By Bob Guerette

The Lakes Association and the Town of Island Falls have been included to participate in a 3 year study by the College of Ecology & Environmental Science and the Climate Change Institute at the University of Maine. The study involves core sampling at Pleasant Lake and Mattawamkeag Lake. Analysis of the core samples will provide information on how algae growth has responded to interactions between nutrients and climate over time. Core samples can capture as much as 125 years of historical data from the lake bottom. The research will use historical climate data to determine the effects of warming winters (and conversely the effects of warmer summers) on algae growth.

Cyanobacteria like Gloeotrichia (those little green spherical plants we see floating in the water in late summer) can bloom out of control and produce a highly toxic environment for other organisms and a serious degradation of water quality. Nutrient loading (primarily phosphorus) has long been recognized as the primary reason for algae blooms with increasing air temperatures as a secondary driver. Much research has already been conducted on this topic around the world and the University of Maine has contributed greatly to the knowledge base required to better understand the effects of climate change. For more information visit "Maine's Climate Future: A 2020 Update" at www.climatechange.umaine.edu Being part of this state-wide survey benefits us greatly in many ways. It establishes a relationship with a scientific and research entity and gives us valuable data on a host of environmental variables like

nutrients, temperature, pH and other water quality characteristics that can be used to promote responsible preservation, conservation, stewardship, development and public policy.

AN OUNCE OF PREVENTION: INVASIVE SPECIES & OUR LAKES

Keeping invasive species out of our lakes is a universal goal of municipalities and shore front property owners across the state of Maine and in most parts of the country. The reason for this is that invasive species INVADE and even a small fragment of a plant or a single living organism can start that invasion. Many invasive plants or animals have no natural competitors or enemies. They can grow out of control choking waterways and shorelines, they can produce toxic byproducts that are harmful to fish and other plants, they can deplete oxygen that a lake relies on to keep natural populations of plants and fish healthy. Another undesirable aspect of invasive species is their potential negative effect on land values and the fact that they are very expensive to control or eradicate. This is truly a scenario where an 'ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure' to quote an old Ben Franklin saying.

The Town of Island Falls has raised awareness of the detrimental effects of invasive species in its Comprehensive Plan and its desire to support the work of the Lakes Association to educate people about it. Consequently, we are hopeful to introduce a *Courtesy Boat Inspection Program* at the Mattawamkeag and the Pleasant Lake boat launches this summer. Initially, this is subject to obtaining necessary funding and the ability to provide shelter at each boat launch. If successful, what you can expect is a courtesy boat inspection by a trained individual prior to putting your boat in the water. This is an educational effort only and will benefit the boat owner and the natural resource.

TAKE ACTION! CLEAN BOATS = CLEAN LAKES

- CLEAN off any mud, plants (even small fragments) and animals from boats, trailers, motors and equipment.
- DRAIN boat, live well, engine and equipment away from water.
- DRY anything that comes in contact with water
- NEVER release plants or animals into the water UNLESS you are sure they came from THAT body of water.

THE LAKESMART PROGRAM

Your IFLA LakeSmart team of Nancy Doherty and Sherry Pettyjohn conducted four LakeSmart Evaluations in September. None of the four were eligible for an award at that time, but the property owners were all very interested in doing the best they could to make their lake shore properties LakeSmart. Their concern for the health of our lakes is awesome. A concern that arose during the discussions centered on the Airbnb and rental's industry. Short term renters do not have the same respect for the land or the quality of the lake they are enjoying during

their stay. As more of our shorefront properties are sold, more are being used as an income source. Educating property owners remains a priority for IFLA. We will be contacting realtors and rental property owners in an effort to supply educational materials in their various properties.



TOWN NEWS

MATTAWAMKEAG LAKE UPDATE

The Mattawamkeag water level project is mired in an impasse concerning a conservation easement at the proposed dam site. The conservation easement is very clear about prohibiting any modifications to the river. It will require an act of the legislature to get the easement amended. For that to happen the Town will need to provide more compelling information about the positive impacts of an increased water level. There is some interest in launching a survey of property owners to document support for the project. Those interested in the project or in a survey of property owners should contact the Town of Island Falls

AN UPGRADE ON PLEASANT POND

The Pleasant Lake boat landing is scheduled for an upgrade. The DEP has approved the replacement of the boat ramp planks. The Town will also erect a cedar rail fence around the parking perimeter and make a porta-potty available at the site. Work will be done this spring.

EXPANDED DEVELOPMENT ON PLEASANT

The Town has made no decision on the sale of lakeside lots on the land it owns between the last camp on the South Shore Road and Sand Cove. The snow sled trail connecting the Lake Shore Road to the Dow Farm Road will be developed into a proper road for vehicle traffic. Selective logging will be conducted in the area, and the logging trucks and equipment will enter and exit via the Dow Farm Road. Road construction will begin this summer. Harvesting will be done during the winter months. In the future the Town is hoping to develop a picnic area and public access to the Lake known as the Two Lakes Trail and Picnic Area. They are encouraging lake shore residents to be involved in this project. Please contact the Town Office for more information.

SECURE YOUR LURES!

Soft, plastic lures are popular fishing tackle; and just like all other equipment, it's our responsibility to maintain and dispose of them properly. Over the years, plastic lures have been improperly used and disposed of, consequently ending up on lake bottoms or in fish stomachs. Fish can ingest these lures off the bottom, negatively impacting their health. Soft plastic lures on the land or in the water also pose environmental concerns. Some lures end up in the water intentionally, while others fall off hooks unintentionally.

You may remember seeing the top photo on the right in last year's newsletter showing fishing lures retrieved from Pleasant Lake by Sue Burgos and Mary Ardizzone while snorkeling. It was an effort to raise awareness of the dangers of lures and steps to take to secure them. Sue and Mary snorkeled again this past summer and retrieved even more lures (photo bottom right).

Let's see if we can reduce that number of lost lures by fishing more wisely. Do your part to help keep our lakes clean and fisheries healthy:

- Properly dispose of soft plastic lures
- Secure your lure
- Check your bait often

IFLA DIVERTER & GRANT PROGRAM

The IFLA will continue to provide free driveway diverters to any property owner on both Mattawamkeag Lake and Pleasant Lake. These diverters steer water off of your driveway and into the woods where the water can easily be absorbed, preventing erosion of your driveway as well as keeping dirt and gravel from draining into the lakes.

Why is this so critical? Dirt, leaves, and gravel contain phosphorus. This phosphorus, when in our waters, can promote algae blooms which have a lasting negative impact on our pristine waters. Algae blooms are a huge threat to the fish, natural beauty, and water quality of our lakes.
